They were light brown books, slightly bigger than an A4 size with glossy slick pages and beautiful illustrations. The books had red spines with gold lettering, binding the books beautifully, and they were crafted in a leather like material. They were the latest thing in information retrieval, and flow....*and they did not even have a battery!*

We had the whole collection of about 12 books, A-Z, plus the Indexes. They had pride of place in a new bookcase in my first home. They were always available whenever anyone needed them to look some vital piece of information up.

I could not really afford them, and took them on credit, but if the truth be known we were targeted by an unscrupulous salesman homing in on young military families with his slick patter and sales talk.

I thought they would be a great investment but, in a world, changing rapidly, they were probably out of date quite quickly, as the information therein never changed.

Initially, everything we wanted to know was found within those pages and books.

How many of you have in your possession a smart phone or, at least, some kind of computer at home, that you use to connect with the internet? We live today in a world of interactive connectivity. We have come to expect that everyone has it and assume everyone can use it. We expect things instantly, e-mails, phone calls, messages, directions, meeting links, facetime calls.

On occasions our connectivity can become slower due to the increasing demand around us. I sometimes have to wait an incredibly long time for a computer to access or do the simplest of things. An unacceptably long time, but which is in reality, only a minute or so, on most occasions. I could not believe how slow this machine was becoming.

Yet in 1977 it would have easily taken me much longer to find the right volume and look up the information that I was seeking.

Back in those times I was used to it, it was the normal state of affairs. But in today's world it has become annoying and inexcusable. And if am feeling this way, I am sure that you all have had similar experiences of *the impatience of waiting*.

Some of the younger generations have no recollection of a time when you could not immediately look up a new place for a meal out, or instantly have one delivered to your home. To immediately read recommendations and reviews, easily source directions, invite friends to join the event and all within the span of a couple of minutes, and on such a small device held in the palm of your hand. Whether we all want to recognize it or not, it is a quite different world today, from the brave new world I encountered in 1977.

Our society's response to demand is now, "Don't wait! I want things as quickly as you can bring them to me." That is how our culture is wired, but it goes against God's blessing to us in our lives, because God's blessing comes through times of waiting.

Ecclesiastes 3:11 says, "God, has set the right time for everything".

Are you in a time of waiting? Perhaps waiting for an answer to something? I have understood that it is necessary to take a complete break from ministry as Elizabeth and I, seek refuge away from phones, computers, churches, and people. We do this to recharge and renew ourselves, so that when we return, we will be refreshed with a different perspective from where we both had been before this break. The patience shown in doing nothing at all, equips me to serve more effectively when I return.

Perhaps for a short while we all should take some time out, to just sit and be. It is amazing what you will see and learn, *when the world comes past you*, rather than *you* rushing to keep up with the world. In so doing you just may find the answers you seek...Stay Safe and well.





In the last financial year as a church, we made donations to various charities amounting to £1,222. This included Doorway (Chippenham based homeless charity), DEC Earthquake appeal, Action for Children, and the World Mission Fund of the Methodist Church.

When the finance committee met, they agreed to ask the Church Council (Meeting 12 October) to agree on the two charities we support for the coming financial year. The suggestion is one home charity and one overseas. This will then be put to the AGM on the 5^{th of} November.

If you have a suggestion of a charity, you think we should be supporting please let a steward or a member of the church council know. It will then be taken to the church council for discussion.

In addition, the finance committee will also propose to the church council that we donate a total of 20% of the proceeds of fundraising events such as Concerts to our chosen charities. We will also continue to send the collection at the Christmas Carol Service to a charity.

PROPERTY UPDATE



<u>Doors</u>

The contractors have advised that the glass has been made, and they are waiting for the frames to arrive. They have provisionally booked the 19th and 20th of October for the installation.

Once this has been completed a small new drain will be installed in front of the doors to take the water away from the building.

Lights

The property committee have agreed work to replace the lights in the hall, and vestibule, with more energy efficient units. New emergency lights to replace the existing ones were highlighted by our fire safety survey and this will also be done.

Boiler in Kitchen

A repair may be possible to the boiler, and we are exploring this option with a contractor. If this is unsuccessful, we will look to replace it.

Decorations

We had hoped that the Community Payback team would have undertaken this, but they have been unable to attend over the last few weeks. The property committee is exploring other options to get this work done.

<u>Damp</u>

The damp work is now completed at the front of the church bar the decoration of the wall and skirting.

The contractors used their damp meters around the church and found all damp levels to be within accepted levels.

We have asked them to take a look at the area in front of the vestry, which in the past as caused concern.
