#### From the Treasurer...

Over the past few months there have been a number of highly successful events to raise funds for church funds in general and in particular to meet the costs of the work required to deal with the damp at the back of the church and to replace the church doors. A grand total of  $\pounds 1,887.07$  was raised for church funds by: The Face production; September coffee and craft morning; film night; family history talk: pudding night; Olympics talk; and wreath making workshop.

Since the start of the current financial year (1 September 2023) we have also received a total of £5,600 in donations and external grants for the building work, to add to the £2,660 received in the previous year. In addition, our recent "normal" fundraising events (Harvest lunch, Advent lunch and Christmas fair) have collectively raised £1,679.60.

Over and above all that, we have also received a further grant of  $\pounds 500$  from the District plus a donation of  $\pounds 2,000$  from the funds from the discontinued Day Centre towards our Warm Spaces work.

In the light of all this you could be forgiven for thinking that our church does not face any financial concerns, but, sadly, that is not the case. It is certainly really good news that it looks as though we shall be able to continue our important work for Warm Spaces for some considerable time to come without causing a drain on church funds. It is also good news that it looks as though we will be able to cover the vast majority of the cost of the recent building work through fundraising and grants. So what is the problem?

What concerns me is that our regular income from freewill giving is going down, and our regular expenditure is going up. Our financial situation is still much healthier than that of many other churches just now, but, to coin a well-worn cliché, we cannot afford to be complacent.

In 2018/19, the last full year before the pandemic, our freewill offering added up to £21,174. During covid lockdowns, when we were also fundraising to replace the boiler and carry out other repairs, our freewill offering nevertheless increased significantly. In 2019/20 it totalled £22,396; in 2020/21 it totalled £24,296; and in 2021/22 it totalled £24,040. However, in the year to August 2023 our freewill offering went down to £21,287, and so far in the current financial year it has remained in line with the previous year. The reason why our freewill giving has reduced is simply because several long-standing and generous members of the congregation have either died or moved away.

At the same time as our regular income is reducing, our regular expenditure is going up. In particular:

- Our assessment this year will be some £1,300 more than last year.
- Our gas and electricity bills are increasingly significantly, not only because we are using the church premises more, but also because the amount we pay per unit for our gas will be 50% more this winter than last. Our total gas and electricity bills for October and November this year came to just over £1,000.
- Whilst we are getting to the end of the major repairs which needed urgent action, we will have to continue to spend significant sums to maintain the premises.
- Inflation is inevitably affecting all our costs.

If this increase in expenditure is not matched by an increase in freewill giving, we shall either have to make up the shortfall with ever-increasing amounts of fundraising or else face the prospect of our limited financial reserves being rapidly eroded until they run out.

I know that for some people financial times are hard and that there is little or no scope to increase what they give. I also recognise that others are already very generous with their freewill offerings and/or contribute massively to the church in other ways. Nevertheless, can I please urge everybody who makes regular donations to the church to review the amount they give with a view to increasing it if they are able to do so.

As Craig said at the Church AGM in November, it is very easy to go on paying the same monthly amount year after year without recognising that its value in real terms has gone down.

If you are not currently doing so, please consider making your freewill offering via a Standing Order or by regular or irregular payments direct to the church bank account. The church bank account details are available from Simon.

You can also make your freewill offerings by cheques, payable to Calne Methodist Church, left in the collection plate at church. Whilst we will, of course, accept cash donations in the collection plate at Sunday services, please make your donations by another method if possible.

If you are a UK taxpayer and do not already allow us to claim Gift Aid on your donations to the church, please contact Derek Gard, our Gift Aid Secretary, so that we can claim Gift Aid on your donations from HMRC.

Below is a short synopsis to whet the appetite.

Two people time-travel from the Greece of 500 BC.

An old sorcerer has sent them to experience a vision he has had of a great future city in the North called Lon-don where the sacred Games of the 681<sup>st</sup> Olympiad (1948) are to be held.

Sadly he has got a few things wrong. It's 2024, the time travellers are dressed to 'blend in' for the era of the London Olympics of 1948 – and they have landed in the tiny Republic of Slobodia.

But all is not lost. Their hosts tell them that they can see the whole thing on television. It turns out that the Slobodians' only interest in sport is as spectators. They do no sports or games whatever – on principle. Having got over their shock the two Ancient Greeks decide that something must be done. 2-10 handfuls of members A few live wires Plenty of opportunities A programme full of variety A good helping of tolerance and goodwill A venue large enough for comfort.


#### **METHOD**
