So, is there a way out of the constant cycle of defeat? For the Christian the answer is yes.


We try once again and continue to travel towards Pentecost. Towards a power that changes all things, even following those times, like Peter, when we have failed God.

My life so far..... Edith

When I look back on my life I do seem to have been in a few places, been there, done that, no T Shirt yet! Born in 1933 I grew up a country girl. My father worked on farms working with horses and then on tractors.

During the duration of the war we stayed in one place and I attended the Village Church School. If the siren sounded we were dispatched to the shelters in nearby houses, at home it was under the stairs or the heavy kitchen table when we would hear the planes on their way to places like Southampton, and afterwards see the red in the sky. On the move in1946 for a short time home was near Weymouth where I was to attend the Technical College in Weymouth for a three year Domestic Science course. Unfortunately a river was close by and we flooded and no way was my mother going to stay there.! This was the winter of 1947 (a time to remember). Home was further away and meant longer to travel. Leaving college at 16 in the July I left home to work in the National Children's Home, now Action for Children in Hampshire. Working in one of the several houses with 20 children, it was like a big family home in a little village and I loved it. Over 6 years altogether I worked in two other places and back to where I started for three years in the Physically Handicapped school. In 1956 I decided I wanted to leave communal living and I found my way to Wiltshire and worked at Cherhill Manor with a family with three children. Brought up in the Methodist Church I have attended whereever I was and I was introduced to the then London road chapel and eventually met my future husband and married in 1959 at Malmesbury Chapel. Lived at Bradenstoke moving to Calne in 1962 when my daughter Yvonne was born, Andrew in 1964 and back to London Road Chapel until 1965 when it joined with Silver Street. Eventually becoming involved in Activities, some of the normal committees, Sunday School. Junior youth club. I became a widow in 1973 and eventually moved from the north to the south of Calne, just around the corner from Silver Street. The children were older and there was the Youth Club for them and I was a steward eventually senior steward. Besides Church activities I was involved in the community with the beginning of the Calne Transport and Organiser for the Calne Day Centre using the Church hall here hired by Wiltshire council as a social activity for seniors initially for those who lived alone. For me they were a challenge. I have gradually relinquished responsibilities and leave it to others to organise and just support. I have had to face over the years some life threatening medical situations but with the great support of the NHS, family and friends, prayers and practical help I am still here. I am blessed to have an extended family the younger ones ranging from seven months to thirty one years and two more to come. I am so grateful to have them.
