I am sure there have been times when we have all felt like that. When bodies are unable to complete the tasks, our minds have said can be achieved. Now all this ties in well with this week's letter concerning the passage of time, and the effect it has on our lives.

We are living in a time which is challenging and making people anxious. We are also in a time of reflection as we think about harvest and the blessings in our lives. One can be seen as a negative vision of future, whilst the other a positive reflection of past.

I like the following quote taken from Tolkien's literary work, 'Fellowship of the Ring'. Frodo said... "I wish it need not have happened in my time" "So do I," said Gandalf, "and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us."

In times of great uncertainty, it is easy to fall back to our old ways of self-criticism and lack of self-worth. The theologian Paul Tillich when writing about grace says.

"Grace strikes us when year after year the longed-for perfection of life does not appear, when the old compulsions reign within us as they have for decades, when despair, *I'm just not good enough, I'll never make it, I wonder if I have what it takes,* destroys all joy and courage. Sometimes at that moment a wave of light breaks into our darkness, and it is as though a voice were saying, 'you are accepted'.

Being accepted by others in a positive way is what we all seek. It is the nature of life. It is the positive affirmation that we belong, are valued, and most of all, loved for who we really are. A negative response comes to us when we fail to realize this and try to become something we are not.

When I really think about it, every single change that I had ever gone through in life which has been positive, every single improvement I have made in my character and in my life, has not come because someone, myself or anyone else, was criticizing, being negative, or condescending of my efforts. It has been because someone has believed in me, encouraged me, looked past my flaws, and saw only my talents, encouraging me to be positive, and make the most of the gift of time, *which is so precious to us all*.

Maybe the positive to be found in our uncertain world, is that we value our time much more. We look to make the best use of our time, knowing we cannot guarantee what will happen to us in the future. And as so often is the case with making any kind of positive change in the world, the best place to begin to change the negativity, *is always with ourselves*.

"Finally, brethren, whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy — meditate on these things." *Philippians 4:8*

Perhaps the next time you are battling with those negative thoughts, take heart by remembering you have the presence of Christ in your life, and that makes all the difference. For the time I have been given, I will value, and use it well. I will live in a Spirit of Hope.

I may wake up tomorrow with aches and pains, and a reminder that I am no longer as I used to be, but in the autumn of my life. But I will wake up still with a smile on my face, as I know I am loved, and cared for by the one who will gather me in and take me home when the time comes. May we all see that wave of light finally break into the darkness at such a time and hear the shepherds voice say, 'you are accepted, and you are mine'.

That is the best positive message of hope to hold on to, despite the negativity of all those who cannot hear or see God in this world.

Pension Credit – What's it all about.

With the government removing the winter fuel allowance from all pensioners other than those who are on Pension credit and the estimate that 800,000 pensioners are eligible for pension credit but do not claim it I thought that the following from Age UK might be interesting and helpful.

What is Pension Credit?

Pension Credit is a means-tested benefit for people over State Pension age who have a low income. It comes in 2 parts: Guarantee Credit and Savings Credit. It's separate from your State Pension.

How much Pension Credit could I get?

Pension Credit comes in 2 parts. You might be eligible for one or both parts.

What is Guarantee Credit?

Guarantee Credit tops up your weekly income to a guaranteed minimum level. This level is currently:

- £218.15 if you're single.
- £332.95 if you're a couple.

What is Savings Credit?

Savings Credit is extra money if you've got some savings or if your income is higher than the basic State Pension. It's available to people who reached State Pension age before 6 April 2016. You could get up to:

- £17.01 extra per week if you're single.
- £19.04 extra per week if you're a couple.

By claiming Pension Credit, you might become eligible for other benefits too, such as help with health and housing costs. We've outlined these below.

Am I eligible to claim Pension Credit?

There are different eligibility requirements for each of the parts of Pension Credit.

Can I get Guarantee Credit?

You might be eligible for Guarantee Credit if you've reached State Pension age. This is currently 66 for both men and women.

If you've reached State Pension age, you can claim Guarantee Credit if your weekly income is less than:

- £218.15 if you're single.
- £332.95 if you're a couple.

Even if your weekly income is higher than these thresholds, you could still claim Guarantee Credit if you meet one of the following criteria:

- you're a carer.
- you have a severe disability.
- you have certain housing costs, such as service charges.

• you're responsible for a child or young person who usually lives with you.

Can I get Savings Credit?

If you reached State Pension age before 6 April 2016 – or if you're a couple and both of you did – you might be eligible to claim Savings Credit.

There isn't a savings limit for Pension Credit. However, if you have over £10,000 in savings, this will affect how much you receive.

If you're a mixed age couple (meaning only one of you is over State Pension age), you normally have to claim <u>Universal Credit</u> until you've both reached State Pension age. Then you might be eligible to claim Pension Credit as a couple.

How to claim Pension Credit

To claim Pension Credit, you can either:

- <u>claim online on GOV.UK</u> (if you already claim State Pension and there aren't any children or young people included in your claim)
- call the Pension Credit claim line on **0800 99 1234** and they can fill in the application for you over the phone (lines are open Monday to Friday, 8am-6pm).

It can be helpful to have the following details to hand before you get started:

- your National Insurance number
- your bank account details.
- information about your income, savings and investments
- information about your pension (if you have one)
- details of any housing costs you have (such as a mortgage, interest payments or service charges)
- your partner's details, if you have a partner.
