The Christmas Truce of 1914 was an unofficial ceasefire during World War I, where British and German soldiers came together in no man's land to celebrate Christmas, exchange gifts, and even play football. The Christmas Truce occurred primarily on

December 24 and 25, 1914. This event took place just five months after the war began, amidst the brutal realities of trench warfare. Soldiers on both sides were experiencing the harsh conditions of winter and the grim realities of a protracted conflict that had already claimed so many lives. Henry Williamson, a nineteen-year-old private in the London Rifle Brigade, wrote to his mother on Boxing Day:

Dear Mother, I am writing from the trenches. It is 11 o'clock in the morning. Beside me is a coke fire, opposite me a 'dug-out' (wet) with straw in it. The ground is sloppy in the actual trench, but frozen elsewhere. In my mouth is a pipe presented by the Princess Mary. In the pipe is tobacco. Of course, you say. But wait. In the pipe is German tobacco. Haha, you say, from a prisoner or found in a captured trench. Oh dear, no! From a German soldier. Yes, a live German soldier from his own trench. Yesterday the British & Germans met & shook hands in the Ground between the trenches, & exchanged souvenirs, & shook hands. Yes, all day Xmas day, & as I write. Marvellous, isn't it?

Last Sunday our section service of worship brought together our churches and community for fellowship, and hospitality with a wonderful meal. The message of the service was to reflect on the advent season whilst preparing for the gift of Christmas. Perhaps *to be still* and remember the true meaning of Christmas despite the difficulties each of us may face in the coming weeks. To find that peace that so often eludes us.... *To be present* in the moment... I once read a blog in which the writer observed on his travels to Japan how to say some basic phrases in Japanese such as, "Where am I?" In Japanese because the answer is self-evident, 'you are here', the question then has to be, "Where is here?"

It is said that most of us spend most of the time anywhere but *here in this moment*. Most of us, most of the time, are living in the past or the future, more fully than we are in the present. Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "We postpone or remember. We do not live in the present, but with reverted eye lament the past, or, heedless of the riches that surround us, stand on tiptoe to foresee the future." We are therefore not here. We are in the past or in the future. Let us be here in the moment... **now!**

Matthew and Luke, tell their own Christmas stories of the moment the world changed. Matthew tells of the Wise Men, whilst Luke talks of the shepherds. Matthew reminds us of the brutality of Herod and his soldiers, whilst Luke tells of the compassion and kindness of the innkeeper. During our Carols by Candlelight services, we will hear those familiar words of scripture once more as we gaze at the nativity scene in awe and wonder. We become present in the moment.

Emerson once commented that our relationship to the stars, to our lives, would be radically different if the stars came out only **once** every thousand years. The environmentalist Paul Hawken accepts that observation, and comments, "Instead, the stars come out every night, and we watch television." A star once changed the world forever, signifying the true Christmas message of peace. That message survives even in a troubled and divisive violent world that we live in today.

For a moment in 1914, the spirit of Christmas stilled the sounds of death and destruction, replacing them with a common sense of peace and fellowship. As a young soldier truly *being present in that moment* once wrote, 'Marvellous, isn't it'? At Christmas we acknowledge that we are not on our own even amid the messiness of our world and lives, God is present beside us. May we all *be present* in the moments of peace and love the Christ Child brings as we celebrate his birth once more. The Peace of the Lord be with you, Happy Christmas, Craig and Elizabeth
