We have been sharing life stories from the beginning of human civilization and for good reason. Stories captivate our attention and build communities by bringing ideas, emotions, and experiences to life in a memorable way.

I remember things from my childhood that really impacted on my life. One of these was reading books. The library was accessible and quite often I lost myself in the stories of others, entering new worlds and perceptions of life that enabled me to grow. Stories have always been written to pass on a message or understanding of life from the writer's perspective. Written by a former Greek slave, in the late to mid-6th century BCE, Aesop's Fables are the world's best-known collection of morality tales. The fables, numbering 725, were originally told from person-to-person as much for entertainment purposes but largely as a means for relaying or teaching a moral or lesson. One such example is the story below...

A man who lived a long time ago believed that he could read the future in the stars. He called himself an Astrologer and spent his time at night gazing at the sky. One evening he was walking along the open road outside the village. His eyes were fixed on the stars. He thought he saw there that the end of the world was at hand, when all at once, down he went into a hole full of mud and water.

There he stood up to his ears, in the muddy water, and madly clawing at the slippery sides of the hole in his effort to climb out. His cries for help soon brought the villagers running. As they pulled him out of the mud, one of them said: *"You pretend to read the future in the stars, and yet you fail to see what is at your feet! This may teach you to pay more attention to what is right in front of you and let the future take care of itself."* "What use is it," said another, "to read the stars, when you can't see what's right here on the earth?"

Take care of the little things and the big things will take care of themselves.

It might appear at present that we are living with the end of our comfortable world as we once knew it. We are looking to the heavens for signs, to see what is going to happen next. These days we all look to the future to see if we can second guess what will happen in the world. Holidays...where to go, when and if to go. Churches to remain open or

not. To eat out or in, to visit beaches or not. To go out, but some are too afraid to contemplate such an act in the dark nights. We become so preoccupied with everything in a chaotic world that we are in danger of missing out and living our life well. So much misinformation and conflicting opinions.

Even the weather has become remarkably unpredictable, so my retreats to find peace in my garden have not been as often as I would have liked. However, thinking about the small things in front of me, to live in the moment, I am pondering, you can still garden in the rain, for humanity has been doing it for centuries.

You do not have to travel to see great wonders. The world can be wonderfully positive in something, so small and simple as a garden. Many creatures are in mine living out their stories every day. The robins, the blackbirds, the wood pigeons, the squirrel, the cats, the frogs, a wealth of life being lived to the full. Creation living out life in what is before them and in the present moment, in the small things that matter. They have no care for what is beyond the reality of their daily existence and experience.

Jesus was ***‘the’*** master storyteller. He always assessed the context of his listeners very well. His stories /parables have stood the test of time and are just as relevant and meaningful today as they were over two millennia ago. The little and simple things in the stories of Jesus mattered. The sparrow, the widow’s mite, the mustard seed, the yeast, the small children. It seems ***‘small’*** is particularly important to God. According to the verses found in Luke 16:10, *“Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much.”*

Therefore, the little or small things you have already, are there to prepare you for bigger things. The key is to trust God while possessing the little things. ***Do not dismiss the small things in your life.***

Small things will develop into a harvest of blessings when you allow God to use them for loving purpose. I encourage you to take some time as you read this letter to think about the ways or places where you could do just a little bit and that it may have a profound impact. You may not have access to a garden, but I bet you could find someone you could reach out to with a phone call. Someone you could show love to by sending them a card or letter. Maybe there is a small task in your church that could use just *a little bit of your time*. There are so many ways your smallest act can impact those around you for the Kingdom of God.

God is looking for people just like you who are willing to make a difference in the places God has positioned you. The best part is, all it takes is *just a little*, but the joy and the rewards can be so much greater for someone else in need.

Our theme for Lent and Easter 2026








LET GO! Pause. Breathe. Make space for God.

The Gospel of Mark tells us that Simon and Andrew 'left everything' to follow Jesus. But this was only the beginning. The symbolic leaving behind of boats and nets is met again and again in their experience of travelling with Jesus. They have to leave places where they have been popular or had divine illumination, and exchange territories of relative safety for places of danger. Most of all they have to let go of established ideas that have formed their world view up to this

point. All views that would be challenged along the way, and the disciples would be invited over and over again to let go and follow.

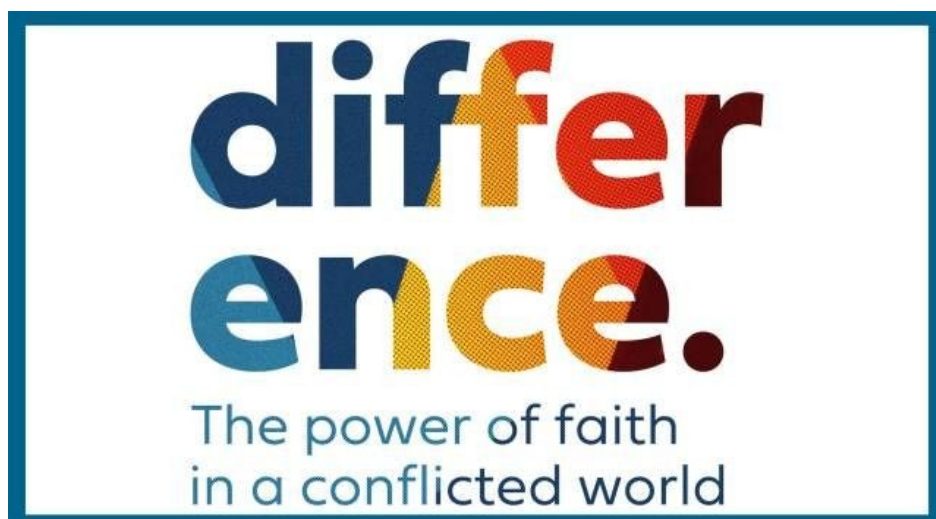
The 2026 Methodist Church Lent series calls us to loosen our grip on what holds us back – habits, assumptions, fears – and to open ourselves to the transforming presence of God.

Each week, we explore a different mindset shift: letting go of something that limits us and becoming open to something that brings life. This journey is not linear or easy. It echoes the experience of the disciples who again and again had to let go of what was familiar in order to follow Jesus more deeply.

1. **God's call:** God can transform relationships in a conflicted world. God's call and equipping make that possible.
2. **Crossing divides:** God invites us to see where difference or prejudice divide us from others and offers us opportunities to see them as he does.
3. **Navigating disagreement:** God is with us as we face the challenge of disagreement, which can become an opportunity for stronger relationships if handled well.
4. **Practising forgiveness:** God is with us in the mess complexity of trying to put forgiveness into practice in our relationships.
5. **Risking hope:** Doing relationships God's way will sometimes be risky and resisted, but the hope it brings is transformative.
